Community Kindness Grants

An innovative opportunity for students in Campbellford to learn about philanthropy by implementing a kindness project that connects them to the community.

How it works:

- GRANT AMOUNT: There is \$1,000.00 available per school each school year for community kindness projects. The projects must be something for, or in, the community.
- ELIGIBILITY: Each teacher in the school is eligible to apply for their classroom or for a school group for supplies for their kindness project. (i.e. cost of books, supplies, or travel).
- TIMEFRAME: A community kindness project can be undertaken any time during the school year but must be completed by the end of the school year.
- INSPIRE: Teachers talk about philanthropy and together with their students plan a kindness project that connects them to the community.
- APPLICATION: Application forms are available at the school office or on the Community Foundation website. Visit <u>www.cscf.ca/community-impact/apply-grant/</u> for a fillable form.
- AUTHORIZATION: Teachers submit the application to their Principal for project approval. The Principal forwards the application to the Community Foundation for final approval. (1-week turnaround)
- REPORT: After completion of the kindness project the teacher submits a report with stories, pictures and feedback from students about their experience to the Community Foundation.
- SHARE: The class shares their kindness projects with the school community through a presentation at an assembly, on a hallway bulletin board, in a school newsletter or on social media (if applicable).
- ACKNOWLEDGE: Please acknowledge the Community Foundation when sharing your kindness project. Our logo is available on our website - <u>http://cscf.ca/news/media-centre/</u>
- IMPACT: The Community Foundation reserves the right to use submitted stories and pictures on social media.

How to pick a project

Many teachers already have an annual project they do in the community with their class that meet the guidelines of this grant initiative. You can expand on it with a Community Kindness Grant, or initiate a new project.

Teachers and students can think about the following when considering a kindness project:

Inspiration – Interests and Activities:

- Ask your students what they love to do. What makes them smile? What they are passionate about? What issues they care about?
- Explore with them how acts of kindness can impact the whole community.
- What are the community needs? Get to know your community. Make community connections.
- Align project with a National calendar event -Remembrance Day, Earth Day, Thanksgiving, Grandparents Day, Disabilities Awareness Month, GivingTuesday, etc.
- Align project with an issue Littering, clean water, bullying, poverty, safe communities, literacy, animal welfare, etc.

Take action - What can students give:

- **Time?** How do they want to spend their time? Serve, volunteer, create?
- Talent? What are your students good at? What skills do they have?
- Treasure? What do they have to give? Money, toys,
 backs food or

books, food or something else?

Preparation:

- Create a plan
- Work with classmates, the school community, other teachers, and/or community leaders.

Some ideas to think about:

Time:

- Volunteer for a local charity or community organization.
- Put together care packages to distribute to a cause.
- Serve a meal. Pick up litter. Start seedlings for the community garden.
- Visit seniors and play games or cards with them or put on a show.
- Select a local charity and learn what services and programs they provide in the community. Visit them. Thank them.

Talent:

- Good at building? Art? Music? Comedy? Baking? Share your talents with the community.
- Convince others to join your class to act on an issue that is important to them. Research and then advocate.
- Start a campaign anti-littering, antibullying, acts of kindness everyday. Engage the community.
- Organize an "a-thon". Walk, run, jump, ride
 whatever be creative!

Treasure:

- Fundraise \$\$'s for an ongoing program in our community.
- Collect toys, books, clothing, or food items for a local drive.
- Collect pet supplies and donate them to a local animal welfare organization.
- Collect items for victims of fire, flood or other disaster in our community.
