# Job Opportunity For Youth Grants

The CFCSN's **Job Opportunity for Youth** grant program provides charitable and not-for-profit organizations that support the Campbellford/Seymour community with funding to provide summer employment for youth.

This year, five community service organizations received grant funding to hire a student:

- <u>Artworth Trent Hills Art Camp in partnership with Innresponse</u>- Rachel will be immersed in the arts as an Assistant Camp Coordinator, and will develop leadership skills as she oversees the teen volunteers.
- <u>Campbellford Memorial Hospital Foundation</u> Riley will gain hands-on fundraising, marketing and event management experience as a Development Officer Assistant.
- <u>Community Care Northumberland</u> Paisley will experience all aspects of support services for seniors as an Office Administrator Assistant.
- <u>Inclusion Northumberland</u> MacKenna will help provide a fun, educational and physically active experience for camp participants as a Summer Camp Counsellor.
- <u>Rotary Club of Campbellford</u> Madison will develop many small business skills as the Canteen Operator at Kennedy Park this summer.

The experience provides students an opportunity to learn about charitable and not-for-profit organizations as well as introducing them to the career options in the not-for-profit sector. Since 2008, 85 students have benefited from this grant initiative.
